

Searching for the Musical Dossenbachs - in the Parks and Music Halls of Early 20th Century Rochester, and Along the Shores of Lake Ontario

Hermann and Theodore Dossenbach, children of poor German immigrants, founded the Rochester Park Band, the Dossenbach Orchestra (precursor to the RPO), and the music school which became the Eastman School of Music. They were also George Eastman's Quartet from 1905 to 1919. Rochester was their city, but Lake Ontario was their playground where they entertained at Ontario Beach Park, Bartholomay Pavilion, the Island Cottage Hotel, Glen Haven, Sea Breeze/Dreamland, and at Webster's Forest Lawn summer community.



Lisa Kleman, great-granddaughter of Theodore Dossenbach, is researching and writing a book about her glorious relatives. She invites you to step into the past and imagine living in a time long gone but never forgotten.

"The Manhattan Project - Making the First Atomic Bombs" by Wally Rust.

This World War II veteran will talk about the atomic principles involved and the scientists who formulated the bomb as well as, heavy water production in Norway, plutonium production in Hanford WA, the test explosions in Los Alamos NM, the four ways of enriching uranium, the three kinds of U-235-producing Calutrons at Oak Ridge TN, and life at Oak Ridge.

He will also give design details of Little Boy, the Hiroshima bomb, and Fat Man, the Nagasaki bomb, and the damage they caused. His talk will be illustrated with many unclassified photos, maps, and detailed drawings. You will hear radiation emitted from samples of uranium ore and uranium metal. This will be presented at an easily understood high-school level.

The theme for this year's event, during the weekend of September 9th through 11th, is "Save a Photo, Save a Memory, A Weekend of Remembrance" in commemoration of the 15th anniversary of September 11, 2001.

Each day free scanning and restoration of precious photos and memories will be made in locations that serve area residents – Rochester Academy of Medicine, September 9, 5:00 -8:00 pm, **Greece Historical Society, Saturday, September 10, 10:00 am - 4:00 pm** and Henrietta Ambulance Sunday, September 11, 10:00 am - 4:00 pm. Hosts at each location will be on hand to provide attendees with information on their services to the community and conduct tours of their facilities. Local experts will offer free scanning and restoring of up to 50 photos or slides, demonstrate software to restore photos or documents and offer advice on how to organize and safely archive originals.



Admission is free and includes: Scans up to 50 photos or slides per person with Kodak Alaris scanners. Photo fix up to 10 photos with Vivid-Pix RESTORE software. Learn from the experts: get tips on archiving, storing and organizing photos by Archival Methods and Corkscrew Photography. **Bring your own flash drive or SD card.**

Did You Know.....?

Perhaps you've been reading about the Army Corps of Engineers and their work at Braddock Bay. Here's a little background information on the area. Braddock Bay was formed



by a glacier as it retreated north. It's a shallow water bay marsh and the only natural opening to Lake Ontario; unlike the other ponds it has not yet been cut off from Lake Ontario by massive sandbars (so massive homes are built on them). But it was in danger of happening over the last decades as silt built up and it's what this new project seeks to rectify. It and its neighboring ponds was a land of great natural resources: fish, water fowl, and game such as beaver, mink, muskrat, raccoons, otters, and marsh rabbits. During the warmer seasons, Native Americans camped by the shores of the bay and ponds attracted by the plentiful fish and game and to gather cranberries from the bogs. The bay and ponds were renowned for their abundance of fish. One native of the area recalled that during the 1950s "Braddock Bay was fabulous for 'pan fishing', in fact all kinds of fishing. There were bass in the spring and in the winter months the big Pike used to come in."

Hundredth Anniversary of Woman's Suffrage in New York State

Next year, 2017, is the 100th anniversary of Woman's Suffrage in New York State. Representatives from a number of organizations, including your own Greece Historical Society and Museum, met to begin formulating plans for special events, exhibits, and programs to mark this historic milestone. The Rochester Area Suffrage Centennial Alliance (RASCA) will act as a clearinghouse for sharing ideas in "the planning, implementation and marketing of centennial programs and events." Among the institutions comprising RASCA are the Rochester Public Library, the Rochester Museum and Science Center, the Susan B. Anthony House, RIT, University of Rochester libraries, Friends of Mount Hope Cemetery, Brighton Historical Society, WXXI, and GEVA Theatre.

The Society is going to do its part—volunteers from GHS are already in the initial stages of preparing an exhibit on how women from Greece participated in the movement, pro and con, with a spotlight on the Charlotte Equality Club (Charlotte, of course, was part of the town of Greece until 1916).




Greece History by Alan Mueller

William Aeberli (1925 - 2011) was a Greece resident for most of his adult life. A man who wore many hats in his lifetime, he was a printer and linotype operator, a cartoonist, a sketch artist in pen and ink, a painter in both watercolor and oils, an avid gardener with his wife June, as well as a bird watcher. He loved history, and would do extensive research on many local subjects. For almost twenty years he wrote and illustrated articles, sometimes covering a number of issues in *The Greece Press* and other related papers owned by Wolfe publications. One of Aeberli's favorite topics, railroads, provided readers with a series of long articles on the B.R.&P. Railroad and the Cobourg Car Ferries.

The New York Central "Hojack Line" running through northern Greece was another favorite subject. Bill illustrated a 1970's ink sketch (see below) of the 1880's "Barnard Crossing Station" on Dewey Ave. for his column relating to the New York Central branch, which ran from its mainline in Rochester to the docks at Charlotte, with a connection on the "Hojack line".

The recent photo shows the sturdy freight and passenger station now housing the Barnard Crossing Bar and Grill. The jaunty station's patrons can often hear an occasional freight passing on the track just outside, much like the station master did one hundred thirty years ago.
