

Speakeasy Locations

Nightclubs were the upscale establishments providing not only food but often an orchestra and dancing. The joints really started to jump at 10 p.m. and the revelry could continue until dawn. These included Grand View Hotel, Sea Glades, and Terrace Gardens.

A **roadhouse** traditionally was an inn or tavern, built on or near a major road, which catered to passing travelers. They usually served food and drinks and had rooms for overnight lodgers. These included Buckert's Hotel, Maier's, and Domino Inn.

The **neighborhood bar** or **saloon** could still sell drinks with less than 0.5% alcohol, but would provide their customers with the "real stuff" until caught. These included Spitz's Tavern.
